## HIEU 124GS: The City in Italy | Rome

## **Course Description**

This course examines the legacies of Rome by exploring how the city, its imperial past, and its transformation throughout the ages influenced the thought and ideas of scholars, critics, and artists from the Renaissance to the twentieth century. Students will engage with different literary and artistic genres including memoirs, letters, political treatises, poetry, drama, opera, and film to explore the impact that the memory of Rome and the experience of its urban environment and civic culture have had on the Western humanistic tradition.

## Course Requirements:

Participation (30%): This is an experiential learning course. Participation in weekly excursions, meaningful engagement with the readings, and peer-to-peer collaboration are crucial to student success.

Reading Guides (10%): Students will complete two reading guides to aid with their comprehension of Machiavelli and Shakespeare.

Weekly Letter (40%): Letter writing in early modern Europe gave rise to a long-distance intellectual community that crossed national and continental boundaries. This community was known as the Republic of Letters. Students in HIEU 124GS will participate in their own Republic of Letters by writing to a designated peer each week about their experiences in the city and reflections on the readings. This is a formal writing assignment. Formatting instructions will be provided.
